

Buckman designated Executive Director

Martha Buckman's 24 year career at GSC evolves into position as executive director.

The Good Samaritan Center Board of Directors made it official at the June meeting, naming Martha to the position she had been filling since December 2012. She credits the proactive board of directors for easing the stresses of the past few months.



Joining the organization in 1989 Martha began as a part time caseworker. For many years she coordinated the food pantry, along with casework. For six years she administered the GSC transitional living program, and eventually was named as Emergency Assistance Director. From Board President Martin Conrad, "Martha is one of the most dedicated people I have ever met. She knows GSC, she knows the community, she knows the supporting agencies, and, most importantly, she knows the clients.

In a typical week she is usually the first employee in the building and the last one to leave at night. It is not uncommon for me to go by GSC on the weekend and see her car parked there. With all the hours she puts in , Martha never asks for anything for herself. She is, however, concerned about other employees and increases they need and deserve.

With Martha as executive director the budget has improved somewhat, but the economy continues to make it challenging to manage GSC."

A young family is aided by GSC in its journey toward self-sufficiency.

Sam moved with her husband and two babies to Excelsior Springs from Georgia in 2010. Soon after, she learned that her husband was unfaithful so asked him to move out of their apartment. It wasn't long before she was stressed about her situation and finances. She kept their apartment as both their names were on the lease. The children's father, coming to the apartment to care for the children while Sam worked, brought a girl friend there.

When Sam came to GSC for help, she was angry with him, he wanted her to get out of the apartment, her family was in Ohio but she was afraid to take them across state lines. She had applied for housing help, but was on a waiting list. At GSC, Sam was advised to relax and find her power. She was to contact Legal Aid, and continue to accumulate some savings. She was to call the GSC caseworker if she got stuck. Two weeks later she called to say her prayers had been answered and she was getting into an apartment at Ruey Anna. She used her savings for half the deposit, and GSC paid the other half.

Several months later Sam returned to GSC to see if she could get help moving from Public Housing to Section 8 Housing. The caseworker made the call to see about a new deposit. Sam had been a good tenant, so her deposit was rolled over to the new place. GSC helped her with Christmas for her kids that year. The caseworker says Sam was very emotional with gratitude.

A year and a half later, Sam asked for help with an electric bill. She had been a full time student for a year, working toward becoming an abused women's counselor. She had been abused by her father and her exhusband. The ex-husband had quit paying child support. She had been unable to find work that would fit with her student/mom schedule so was living off student loans. She was receiving food stamps. She promised to do well on her mid-term exams in gratitude for help with the electric bill.

Sam called this year to say she and the kids are doing well. They moved to a house near Penguin Park. Her son is starting kindergarten. She has finished her bachelor's degree and will start work on her master's soon. She wanted to thank GSC for the support during a very difficult time of her life. She believes it was an important component of her success.
